

Comprising the organizational records of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC), the world's leading Jewish humanitarian organization, the Archives includes over 3 miles of text documents, 150,000 photographs, a research library of more than 6,000 books, 1,100 audio recordings including oral histories, and a video collection.

With records of activity in more than 90 countries dating from its founding in 1914 to the present, the JDC Archives has two centers, located in New York City and Jerusalem, and is open to the public by appointment.
